'Ramalingaswami Re-entry Fellowship' is a prestigious scheme of the Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science & Technology, Government of India. The scheme is conceptualized with the aim of attracting highly skilled Indian nationals working overseas in various cutting edge disciplines of biotechnology such as agriculture, health sciences,

bio-engineering, energy, environment, bioinformatics and other related areas by providing them an attractive avenue to pursue their research interests in the Indian institutions.

Unfortunately, India has been a victim of the phenomenon of 'Brain Drain' and it is a great national waste in terms of money and manpower. It is nothing short of a national tragedy that our people, trained and educated at the expense of the Indian tax-payers, should leave the country at the very first opportunity. Our country is facing difficult challenges posed by poverty, unemployment, malnutrition, etc and we need to resolve these issues. This effort will require armies of trained personnel of scientists, technologists and specialists in their respective fields for a planned development. Instead of contributing to the prosperity of India, the Indian scientists, research scholars, engineers, doctors and economists migrate to other countries and have settled abroad. Still, some of them would like to come back to India.
